
Canadian Volksmarch Festival:

Beavertails and British Royalty

Warning: While the article below includes a description of the Canadian Volksmarch Festival (CVF), it also contains castles, Canadian bacon, beavertails and British royalty.

The 2024 CVF in Kingston, Ontario from May 24-26th attracted 387 walkers from five countries. Virginia Volksmarchers who participated included Steve & Susan Brown, Tim & Cecilia Miner, and Dianne Purdy. All ten walks offered during the three-day event started along a picturesque waterfront. Each 5 and 10km route included historic sites in this very interesting city that served as the first capital of the United Canada Province.

A unique fort built to protect the Kingston harbor from American military forces was featured on the 2024 CVF logo. If you travel to the area, plan to visit the historic fortifications, which are a part of a UNESCO World Heritage site. The British built multiple 3-story towers as gun platforms, observation posts and barracks to help control the strategic confluence of Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River. The 3-ton cannons required a 7-man crew to rotate them along a circular track inside the tower's top floor.

Her Royal Highness Diana visited Kingston in 1991, when she met with the Princess of Wales Own Regiment. Susan and I received somewhat royal treatment while visiting the Royal Military College, where future Canadian officers earn their degrees and commissions. At the beginning of their training, cadets enter the RMC through an

impressive carved stone arch and are not permitted to go through it again until they graduate. Also in this charming coastal city is a former maximum-security penitentiary, which is now a popular tourist attraction and location for filming movies and television series (such as Star Trek and Murdoch Mysteries).

While the walks were terrific, and the banquet was popular, the premier CVF activity was a Sunday evening cruise along the St. Lawrence Seaway among the Thousand Islands. Although the Boldt Castle and Singer Castle have commanding views of the New York and Ontario mainlands, they are opulent mansions without fortifications.





Ottawa River waterfront to Parliament Hill. There, we explored the beautiful House of Commons chamber and appreciated the differences with our national government. We also expanded our knowledge during a tour of the Governor General's house, where British monarchs exercise their authority over the Canadian government. Before returning to Virginia, I cycled along a portion of the historic Rideau Canal, which is very popular for ice skating when it is frozen.

We also enjoyed Canadian culinary specialties like maple syrup, smoked meat sandwiches and Beavertails (world famous Canadian pastries) with ice cream. A few days after we departed was a popular annual rib festival, which attracts huge crowds. Our next trip to Ottawa may be timed to either ice skate on the canal or enjoy great ribs.

June Group Walk at Smith Mountain Lake: The Jewel of the Blue Ridge

See Smith Mountain Lake State Park - Jewel of the Blue Ridge Mountains! The park is a 4-hour drive from Northern Virginia.

Meetup event is: <u>https://tinyurl.com/ynupzxuy</u> and Park website is: <u>https://tinyurl.com/yc4fz2n3</u>. Trails featured are 5 or 10 km (3.1 or 6.2 miles) and in places have elevation gain from the shore to the ridge line. Trails are heavily forested but you can generally see the Lake, either close up or in a distance.

The 5km trail takes you past a picturesque tobacco barn and winds along the shoreline, even crossing to Turtle Island, which you will circle around!

The 10km trail is a ridge where American Chestnut trees have been re-introduced. Pay park entrance fee of \$7 at the Visitor's Center, then drive to the Discovery Center. Meet by 9:45 am so we can leave by 10:00 am. Look for walk host Ron Jones at a picnic table on the left side of the Discovery Center.

For ideas about lodging or for more info contact Ron Jones at outdoorsy_guy1@yahoo.com or (703) 217-3140. Cabins at the State Park require a two-night stay. There are drinks and snacks for purchase at the Visitor Center, but you may want to bring them with you.
